JOINTLY DEVELOPED

The parents, students, and staff of Alexander K. McClure Elementary School partnered together to develop this school-parent compact for achievement. Parents are encouraged to attend annual revision meetings held in the Spring of each year to review the compact and make suggestions based on student needs and school improvement goals. Parents are also encouraged to participate in the School Family Engagement survey that is also used as a tool to collect parent feedback regarding the current Title I programs, policies and family engagement.

To understand how working together can benefit your child, it is first important to understand the district's and school's goals for student academic achievement.

THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PHILADELPHIA ANCHOR GOALS:

- 1. 100% of students will graduate, ready for college and career.
- 2. 100% of 8-year-olds will read on grade level.
- 3. 100% of schools will have great principals and teachers.
- 4. SDP will have 100% of the funding we need for great schools, and zero deficit.

Alexander K. McClure Elementary School's GOALS:

- 5. At least 60% of K students, and 75% of 1st and 2nd grade students will make at least one year's growth, as evidenced by their independent reading level from Q1 to Q4.
- 6. No more than 25% of 3rd grade students will score below basic on the 3rd grade PSSA /ELA assessment.
- Grade 3 students will score 34% or higher in Tier I per Aimsweb Math data. Grade 4 students will score 16% or higher in Tier I per Aimsweb Math data. Grade 5 students will score 19% or higher in Tier I per Aimsweb Math data.
- 8. At least 50% of students will attend at least 95 days or more.
- 9. At least 70% of Kindergarten students and 50% of 1st and 2nd grade students will score at target by the Spring AIMSweb Reading Assessment.

To help your child meet the district and school goals, the school, you, and your child will work together:

Alexander K. McClure Elementary School will:

- On a monthly basis, teachers will provide families with an academic calendar, along with games and activities that families can play to review the grade-level skills being covered in class. K-3 teachers who participate in the APTT Grant (Academic Parent Partner Teams) will support families with setting goals and utilize the Report Card conferences times to goal set with families regarding grade level goals and provide resources to support those goals.

Staff will be available during Report Card Conferences, via e-mail, scheduled appointments, MTSS conferences, and IEP conferences. Parent Concern Forms can be found in the Main Office; staff will follow up on concerns within 24 hours, unless there are extenuating circumstances.

Visitors are welcome at McClure Elementary. ALL visitors must have photo identification to enter McClure Elementary. Please follow our Visitor Guidelines prior to visiting:

• Send a note or call your child's teacher to prearrange a time for an appointment when the teacher is not instructing his/her class. If you would like to visit the classroom, 24-hour notice is required. Please

McClure Elementary welcomes parents who would like to volunteer, participate in their child's class, and observe classroom activities. If interested in volunteering, please contact your child's teacher and notify the Main Office. McClure's assigned FACE representative will support parents with the process of obtaining clearances. Parents who would like to volunteer on an ongoing basis require appropriate clearances and will be placed by administration. Ongoing volunteers will not be placed in their child's classroom for extended periods to volunteer.

Classroom teachers will also extend invitations to parents and guardians to participate in class projects, presentations and celebrations. In addition, you may visit the classroom/observe in the classroom by following the visitor guidelines outlined above.

PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES:
